Feedback Obtained

The college has its own distinct system for collection of the feedback from time to time. The institution has good rapport with alumni, parents, peers, employers and students and frequently seeks inputs and suggestions to improve curriculum, teaching, learning and evaluation system and other infrastructural sufficiency. Most of the time it is oral and informal although some departments have evolved structured feedback system. The feedback is collected from all the stakeholders such as students, parents, alumni, employers/public, and peer groups. During the seminars, special occasions like college day, competitions, academic meets, the invitees, resource persons, peer groups and guests interact with the faculty and students. Normally there is reference to the student's quality and other facilities available in the college. The skill less and incompetent generation of today in general is a cause of worry to all the stakeholders and the public. These students in most of the cases do not get placements in campus recruitments or off campus recruitments. As a result the rate of unemployment in India is going up. This is a trend all over. When the training is focused on the skill sets, competencies, the parents and guardians, employers like to show concern by way of suggesting what the need of the day is. The New Education Policy also envisages the integration of skill sets in education and it is indeed very well accepted in the college by its faculty and therefore during Departmental Meetings, Core Meetings, Academic Council Meetings, Governing Body Meetings the discussions revolve round the up gradation of the curriculum. The minutes of every Board of Studies reflect that the discussion on the revision of syllabi and add inputs that can ensure greater and higher skill and competency. The college has been practising Mentorship, Regular Parent Teacher Meetings, Alumni Interactions, and Alumni Meets. In these meetings the parents share their views and give suggestions to be incorporated in the syllabus. For example, in the last PTI meeting the parents suggested to have more assignments and practical components. Accordingly the BOS of every subject incorporated the skill and practical component to greater extent. Similarly the members in Governing Body suggested that at least 40 percent of the syllabus should be skill oriented. All departments are trying to work it out this and make the syllabus more relevant

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Mentorship is one of the best practices of the college. This was initiated several years before. The system of mentoring in the college is deep rooted and the result of the same is reflected in excellent academic performance of the students as well as in the healthy and cordial relationship between students and faculty in the college. The institution has got no untoward incidents till date and this is a clear sign of the functioning of the mentorship. The faculty with the mentees plan and focus on the academic and all round development of the learners. The petty clashes between the between groups of students have been greatly reduced by the mentoring. The success rates in terms of academic performance, and placements are pleasantly noteworthy on account of the kind of counselling, orientation and guidance the learners get in the institution. As per the practice, a batch of 25 to 30 students is allotted to every faculty in the beginning of the year. The monitoring committee undertakes the job formation of batches of mentees, distribution of these batches and giving orientation to all the mentors in the beginning of the academic year. The mentors meet the mentees every week and listen to them and if required give guidance individually or in group Personal counselling is also done to the needy. The slow learners, problematic learners, disadvantaged learners are identified and given not only counselling but also guidance to

manage the academic challenges and excel. If anybody has serious personal issues he/she is referred to the Counselling centre. The specially trained staffs at the centre undertake counselling more professionally. The mentors focus on developing skills and competencies among mentees and maintain the Academic Progress Document. During the parent teacher interaction the academic performance of the students, their extracurricular activities and other issues regarding the all round development of the personality are discussed. The mentors meet the mentees and the parents at least two times in a year for this purpose

The procedures and policies regarding maintenance and utilisation of facilities are communicated to all stakeholders. The students are informed about the use of facilities through frequent written guidelines, instructions and

orientations. In hostels the wall boards, digital boards display the relevant literature on the protection of college property, and prevention from any damage. Orientations on facilities, opportunities and other operating procedures are frequently conducted. The students' handbook, a comprehensive material on how to handle computers and equipments in laboratories are distributed to students in the beginning of the year. The do's and don'ts are put up in the prominent corners of the college The college calendar also has details about how to safeguard the college facilities. The sign boards at every important place in the campus guide the stakeholders about discipline, academic conduct. Also the examination pattern, admission procedures, placements strategies, institutional collaborations, mentoring processes, counselling services, participation in co curricular and extracurricular activities are mandated by various committees and departments. The exclusive committee on maintenance comprising of a full time maintenance officer and several support staff maintains the infrastructural facilities, cleanliness, garden. The committee arranges to place dustbins in every classroom/staffroom/office/lab/library/other centre/other public corners. The separate dustbins for biodegradable and wet wastes and non biodegradable dry wastes help the maintenance staff to separate and dispose wastes. The college has a waste segregation unit, a napkin disposal unit, a waste disposal unit. The Panchayath ujire and the college jointly has taken up the project of waste disposal in a larger scale in the surrounding areas. The review and inspection by the representative of the management gives a special attention for neat and tidy ambience in the campus. The green audit, infrastructural audit, administrative and academic audits help the committee to prepare the repair requirements, requirement of refurbishment of the laboratories and departments, renovations of the building, procurement of maintenance equipments and submit for approval. The management quickly undertakes the needed steps to implement them. The college being a rural college has to cater to the needs of the local people who do not have facilities and spaces for accessing internet of reading. Therefore the college library gives services from 8.30am to 9.00pm on working days and 9.00am to 4.00 pm on holidays and Sundays. The regular surveys and students appraisal of services especially about the functioning of the various centres and units help the management to attend the same and set it right immediately The drafted and institutionalised professional ethics and code of conduct book has been prepared.

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5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

The college has given a different dimension to the Students' Council. In order to involve and train students in different skills and competencies, soon after the election for class monitors the Students Welfare committee interacts with the selected class monitors and guides them about the various Students Fora created for the all round development of the personality. The college has identified nearly 48 areas and for each there is one platform for the interested students. The ActiveFora of the college are: Writers, Readers, Legal and Awareness, Quiz, Communicative English, Cartoon and Painting, Photography and Media, True Education, Craft, Event Management and Debates Fora. The selected class monitors are given the responsibility of coordinating activities of one each Forum. A separate slot is created in the time table and weekly twice the members of various Fora meet and hold diverse activities. The involvement of the students in these Fora is extremely admirable. The Speakers Club, for instance holds activities to develop the public speaking skills and similarly the Forum for event management involves in the management of different college level or university level events. The total result of such initiative is that 80 to 90 of students are involved in one or other creative activities. This has stopped the unnecessary intervention of politics in the students' council. Departmental/Committee meetings: Meetings are held regularly every month. The committee/Department maintains the minutes of every meeting. The regularity and participation of every member is ensured by the higher authority. The college has a management integrated system (MIS) to

collect information about the meeting held and the issues discussed and carried out to ensure the smooth functioning of activities. Statutory Committee, Core Committee, IQAC, BOS, Academic Council and Governing Body Meetings and the minutes: All issues related to routine as well as new initiatives are discussed, reviewed and recorded in the Minutes Book and communicated to all the faculty for implementation. Curriculum Development	The College initiates the up gradation and the revision of the Syllabi of all disciplines every year. The academic policy of the college encourages the faculty to revise the syllabus every year and develop outcome based teaching methodology. The outcomes of every course, programme, and programme specific subjects have been comprehensively stated. The core curriculum is revised according to the changing requirements. The regular interactions with the industries, and other stakeholders help the institution to pool the feedbacks and assess the relevance of the syllabus. Each Department undertakes to collect the feedback from all the stakeholders The BOS of every discipline is oriented to oversee the course content of core subjects, elective subjects, sequencing of units, reading reference lists, question banks, assessment procedures, and the question paper patterns.
Teaching and Learning	One of the best practices of the institution is to provide the required number teaching hours every semester and ensure that all allotted hours are used by the faculty. The weekly assessment of the classes allotted and engaged provides feedback to all the departments to re schedule the classes. The calendar of the semester is prepared well in advance by the calendar committee and the core committee. The core committee guides

the faculty to conduct regular classes as per the lesson plan. The faculty besides preparing the lesson plans for every class make entries in the diary every hour and get them scrutinised by the respective Heads and Deans. In the monthly meetings of the departments, one of the agenda is to review of the work done for the month. The reviews, in the meetings help the faculty to re-plan and compensate if any shortfalls found in the previous month. Moreover the final PBSA (Performance Based Self Appraisal) of every faculty ensures planned and focused teaching. The students' appraisal of the faculty is yet another strategy adopted to assess the performance of the faculty.

Examination and Evaluation

A Separate Exam Section in the college arranges for the conduction of exams, evaluation, and the announcement of results. The Registrar for Evaluation as per the governing examination procedures prepares the schedule of examinations both internal and semester end exams. The core committee after deliberations on examination schedule (on the dates, exam time table and central evaluation dates) approves, publishes and circulates among the faculty for adhering to the schedule. The examination section interacts with each Departmental examiners panel and initiates to prepare question papers, conduct exams, arrange for valuation of answer scripts etc. Besides these regular tasks, it proposes some reforms and innovations frequently. Recently one such innovation was adopted Keyboard exam. In the first Phase two departments were identified and they were guided to have ICT aided Keyboard test. The question papers had questions using images, audios, videos clippings. The students were allowed to write the exam using computers. The answers would directly be saved in the students' dossier and most students felt excited about the exam. It was a successful initiative. Similarly the communication of the guidelines to invigilators and the valuator before the commencement of the exams proved more successful in terms of punctuality, and regularity. The initiative to appoint Flying Squad is yet another strategy of the exam section to prevent the malpractices. The exam section works further to make

the exam system more foolproof and transparent.

Research and Development

The research and development output of the college has been frequently reviewed to enhance research activities in the college. The suggestions given by the NAAC Peer team, in fact helped the institution to focus more on research and development. The initiatives like Student Research Projects, publications of research papers, registering for PhD have been well accepted by the staff and students. The Research committee and the PhD guides in the college interact with faculty very often about the various research schemes of the Government and NGOs. In the last year the Biotech Department was sanctioned two projects of Rs. 13,000,00/ for research. The department of Biotechnology has an MoU with Polyclone Bioservices Private Limited (POLYCLONE) Bangalore for collaborative research. During the present (2019 20) year the college is planning to submit many research proposals under STRIDES and start Research Centre affiliated to Mangalore University. The college publishes a peer reviewed UGC recognised Journal SHODHA

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The College Library has been a coveted place of learning for all the learners in the campus. It is housed in spacious building of total 1102 sq. meters area. It houses 1, 10,000 books. It has a separate section - Sri Ha. Ma. Na. Nayak having 28,158 books. The library provides unique 19 services besides providing 400 reading cubicles. The working hours 8.30am and 8.pm on all working days, and on weekend days from 8.30am to 4,00pm and on Sunday between 10.00am and 5.00pm. The College Administration and all other services and activities are Computerized and monitored by MIS. The system deployed for all academic and administrative management is EERPMS (Educational Enterprises Resource Planning and Management System). It is a comprehensive system that links every committee, dept, individual/stakeholder in view of coordination and administration. Its uniqueness lies in its tracking of the information as and when required in the format we require.

The retrieval of the data for any purpose is simple and easy. The infrastructure of the college is augmented and maintained meticulously. Whenever there is the need of additional infrastructure, the college management takes timely step to provide the same.

Human Resource Management

Human Resource Management deployed in the college helps to manage the staff and ensures the work culture in the campus. • For the proper resource management, the responsibility is stated as advisory, managerial and operative to all stakeholders like the principal, vice principal, registrars, deans, HODs, chairmen and support staff respectively. Accordingly committees are constituted for different purposes with defined objectives and outcomes. • Frequent review meetings are arranged to oversee the activities and speed up the followup processes. • HOD's and Committee chairmen submit compliance reports in every monthly Chairmen meeting. • Timely and frequent reminders are sent through EERPMS/official whatsapp groups for the timely completion of the tasks assigned/planned • Training for the newly recruited staff, frequent orientation programmes to all the staff are organized to make them abreast of the development in the respective areas. • Performance Appraisal System is deployed for the evaluation by the management. This helps the management in finding out whether the employee is fulfilling the duties to achieve the vision of the institution. It also helps to evaluate the employees and provide support system for higher level performance. For low performers developmental plans are designed.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The HRD cell and many Departments invite the Industries and Companies for interaction and placements. The Campus Recruitments, the skill training, resume writing, career counselling, application writing have been undertaken as focused duties of the HRD Cell. The Departments send students for internship of about 15 to 20 days to industries every vacation. The college has future plans to establish Finishing School for preparing students to professions. The feedback from

industries is used while developing the syllabi. The management encourages the department to have linkages and MoU's with industries and organizations.

Admission of Students

The institution has developed several strategies to improve the quality of admission process in view of providing a single window and quick service to admission seekers in the institution. The process has been made easy and hassle free. The simplified admission process helps the institute to build confidence and trust amongst students. Following are the few strategies developed:

- Prospectus (containing a brief about achievements, details of programmes, subject combinations offered, fee structure, documents to be produced and other things like dates of admission and payment of fees etc) is issued to the students along with the application on payment of nominal fee.
- Help Desk Service is offered to avoid confusion and to clarify the queries on programmes, courses, unique feature of college.
- A team of staff is deployed for the admission to give proper orientation about the entire admission process.
- Sign boards are fixed at several points to guide the students/parents to reach a particular section/required destination.
- Rooms with all facilities are provided to the students to fillin the applications leisurely and cautiously and assistance is provided by the staff in filling up of the applications.
- Programme wise committees ease the entire process. The committee members in batches complete the formalities like verifying the documents, interviewing the students and allotting them the particular programme with specified subjects.
- The parents/Guardians are required to accompany the ward for their signature. Proper guidance/information regarding discipline, dos and don'ts, ban of mobile and dress code is given during admission.
- Online admission is also implemented
- The entire admission process is being monitored by Vice principal and Deans.

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

The Institution was established in 1966 by Late Sri D Rathnavarma Heggade, the then Dharmadhikari of Sri Kshethra Dharmasthla. The institution has scaled higher levels under the present visionary leader Dr. D Veerendra Heggade, who is the Dharmadhikari and the President of The SDME Society. Being situated in rural area, the distinct quality of the Institution is its focus on preparing the youths for the employments either in the public or private sector. One of the objectives of the institution is to cater to the needs of the rural youths. As the vision of the institution is Empowerment through Competency Building with Ethical Foundation, the institution focuses on the skills and competencies to be imparted to learners with the required professional ethics. The curriculum is designed with more skill components. The Departments and the respective BOS's review the syllabus every year and update in view of the

present requirement. Besides, the student centric activities such as Presentations, class quizzes, group discussions, class seminars, projects and practical etc not only empower the learners but also give them the exposure required. To enhance the students' activities last year the college ideally converted the Class Rooms as Discussion Rooms and in fact it was a boost to enable students to participate in self learning. All efforts are made to provide learners with learning materials/lectures of the staff by uploading them in EERPMS, an inhouse developed Management Information and Administration System. This MIAS provides links to Lesson plans with videos, and Google class rooms for the students. In order to make the lectures available to the absentees and slow learners, college has initiated SDM Learning Resource Programme. Under this lectures are recorded and made available to students to watch at any time. An exclusive studio is established for the purpose of recording lectures. For the promotion of reading habits of students, the college has introduced Samyakjnana Programme. As per the practice the learners are required to complete 40 library hours in each semester. For the promotion research culture among the students, Students Research Projects are introduced. The college has been offering the interdisciplinary certificate courses to give an additional skill in the subject of students' interest. As a part of the institution's commitment to maintain a healthy academic environment the surrounding is kept neat and tidy. The green audit is being conducted every year.
